b. Follows directions

What You Do

- Explain that a drill sergeant is a person who teaches people how to be soldiers, and that good soldiers do everything the drill sergeant tells, or instructs, them to do.
- Say, "I am your drill sergeant. As good soldiers, when you hear my instructions, do exactly as I say."
- 3. Make sure that students have ample space to move around. Give a multistep order: "I instruct you to [move three steps forward and one step to the left]."
- 4. Continue giving orders, adding steps and/or making the actions more complex: "I instruct you to [skip toward the door] and then [take seven steps backward] [while placing both hands on your head]."

- Encourage students to take turns being the drill sergeant. Support them to give instructions that are complete sentences.
- Invite the students to be "silly soldiers" that is, to do the opposite of what the drill sergeant instructs them to do.
- Vary the drill sergeant's instructions using the following as examples:
 - "Bring me an object that starts with the /s/ sound."
 - "Count to 100 by 10s."
 - "Tell me a word that rhymes with [bear]."
 - "Name your favorite fruit."
 - "Make a [happy] face."
 - "Put on your jackets and line up to go outside."
